


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# Rediscovering Americanism: And The Tyranny Of Progressivism

Progressives really do think that the American people are essentially incapable of managing their own lives. These elites exhibit immense disdain for such core American values as religious liberty, free market capitalism, individualism, free speech and private property rights. Furthermore, progressives loathe due process and the rule of law because in their world the ends always justify the means. They detest tradition and dogma of any kind and crave power. Another great exposition of the evolution of progressive thought, statism, tyranny and liberty from one of our best contemporary writers on these subjects, Mark L. Levin. If you have been reading his books, the references to Locke and other English philosophers that our founding fathers were reading and discussing will be familiar. In this book, Levin takes on one of the greatest challenges we face today--liberty or tyranny? Unfortunately, very few of our citizens today under 40 can even imagine a time when our liberty was threatened. Yet Levin, who served in the Reagan Adminstration's Department of Justice, remembers the Cold War very well, as do I. Liberty, Western Civilization, and America had only 3 decades earlier been under real threat. Taking the Pledge of Allegiance at the beginning of every school day really meant something. We have been under a 25 year attack to undermine the institutions of liberty and republican democracy. Levin sorts out these issues in a way that a reasonably educated reader can sort out and understand--this is his gift, and why his radio show is so popular. The last attempt to define Americanism in detail that I'm aware of was Herbert Hoover's 1922 treatise. Hoover stressed the importance of individual industry and effort, production, to the maintenance of both liberty, and the rugged individualism that he traced back to de Tocqueville's description of the American Character. However, I think Levin would agree that these attributes have been threatened greatly by mass immigration without the demand to assimilate--to learn English, and the American way of life embodied in our founding documents. The descent into tribalism, as practiced in the Middle East for millennia, is nearly palpable. Tribalism is what Lt. Col. T. E. Lawrence (Lawrence of Arabia) found as the major impediment to uniting the Arabs into one state--his early life dream (see the film, Lawrence of Arabia, 1962). It simply could not be done, as Western incursions into the Middle East in the late 20th and early 21st century have shown, again. The friend who armed you, enemy of your enemy, could easily become the enemy you are fighting with the weapons they provided to you, tomorrow. This is a lesson we should have learned long ago. The blessings of the founding of America--life, liberty, the pursuit of happiness (and Levin would add, property rights), are somewhat foreign to many new residents and citizens. They also cannot assimilate through watching films--democracy demands participation, conversation, and argument or we well lose our liberty to social progressivism. To understand more deeply the roots of progressivism and how it came to inflict its ideas on America, I recommend Edmund Morris' 3 volume set of works on the life of Theodore Roosevelt, who really introduced these ideas, as a Republican, into the body politic. Although he vowed not to run for a 2nd term (the first was a nearly full term occasioned by the assassination of Garfield), he did run in 1912, split the ticket three ways, allowing Wilson to take the presidency. Wilson allowed the introduction of the Federal Reserve and the IRS into the Administrative State, and we as Americans have toiled under what Wilson saw as the "ruin" of America by himself personally for a century now. Because Levin draws mostly on political and philosophical works undergirding the Civil Society, it is also necessary to understand how someone withnearly unlimited means (Theodore Roosevelt-R) and his cousin (Franklin Delano Roosevelt-D) could, in the name of some nascent sense of economic and material

egalitarianism, fail to notice that, as Reagan acolytes proposed and demonstrated, a rising tide does raise all boats. We failed to learn the lesson of Teddy's use of the Sherman Anti-Trust Act to "bust" the Northern Railroad Trust, which set all rates for train freight through a monopoly....there are large companies that must be "busted" now in the name of Americanism, plain and simple. The breakup of Ma Bell doesn't seem to have lowered telephone rates, but for about \$20 you can call long distance in the U.S. anytime in a month, and long distance in the 1960s was 25 cents for the first minute and 10 cents for each additional minute on my residential line, if I recall correctly, and higher on public phones, which don't seem to exist much in the U.S., although they are all over Europe. It will take a more cogent and experienced economic mind to see the solution to this--but as the Administrative state considers most Americans to be rather stupid and ignorant, I won't hold my breath for a near-term solution.My main criticism of the hardback, which I hope will be corrected when the paperback is issued, is that lack of an index--the references are good, but any such book requires an index to be maximally useful.

Mark Levin, in Rediscovering Americanism, lays out the progressive movement both historically and philosophically better than anyone that I have read. I learned a lot from this book, and appreciate all of the scholarly work that must of gone into it. I would highly recommend.

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
