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Almighty: Courage, Resistance, And Existential Peril In The Nuclear Age

Nicknamed the â œFort Knox of Uranium, â • Y-12 was supposedly one of the most secure sites in the world, a bastion of warhead parts and hundreds of tons of highly enriched uraniumâ "enough to power thousands of nuclear bombs. The three activistsâ "a house painter, a Vietnam War veteran, and an 82-year-old Catholic nunâ "penetrated the complexâ ™s exterior with alarming ease; their strongest tools were two pairs of bolt cutters and three hammers. Once inside, these pacifists hung protest banners, spray-painted biblical messages, and streaked the walls with human blood. Then they waited to be arrested. WITH THE BREAK-IN and their symbolic actions, the activists hoped to draw attention to a costly military-industrial complex that stockpiles deadly nukes. But they also triggered a political and legal firestorm of urgent and troubling questions. What if they had been terrorists? At a time of concern about proliferation in such nations as Iran and North Korea, the U.S. arsenal is plagued by its own security problems. This life-or-death quandary is unraveled in Zakâ [™]s eye-opening account, with a cast that includes the biophysicist who first educated the public on atomic energy, the prophet who predicted the creation of Oak Ridge, the generations of activists propelled into resistance by their faith, and the Washington bureaucrats and diplomats who are trying to keep the world safe. Part historical adventure, part courtroom drama, part moral thriller. Almighty reshapes the accepted narratives surrounding nuclear weapons and shows that our greatest modern-day threat remains a power we discovered long ago.

This book chronicles the evolution of nuclear weapons in the U.S. while profiling the peace activism, highlighting the role and ineptitude of our government in managing our weapons programs, and placing both of these within historical and international contexts. The story is well told, and I learned a lot of new things often lost in the weeds in the usual political science literature I read. Everyone in the U.S. should read this book!

As someone who lives in the community where this occurred, I found this to be a very fascinating read. Zak's research and presentation are comprehensive, but certainly challenge the dominant narrative inculcated in Oak Ridgers and many Americans alike. Given how far we tend to tilt politically, a counter-perspective may be long overdue. Almighty is an excellent read that I highly recommend.

This book was truly eye-opening -- both in its description of the raw power that nuclear weapons possess, and the lengths certain people will go to remind the rest of us of these dangers. The weaknesses in our own security that "an 80-year-old nun, a Vietnam veteran, and a housepainter" exposed with a late-night break in was not just a huge wake up call for the management of the Y-12 facility, but perhaps more so for people (like me) who, reading this book now: didn't even know this facility existed, hadn't thought much about nuclear proliferation within our own borders beyond the end of the Cold War, or are curious about the grey area between treason and civil

protest/whistle-blowing -- all the more topical in the age of Edward Snowden, Chelsea Manning, and Julian Assange. Most importantly, Dan Zak's thorough yet riveting story-weaving of the three radical (or perhaps not?) individuals responsible for sparking this debate is an absolute pleasure form start to finish. A must read!
