

Bought this as a handy reference and wasn't displeased covers the basics of citrus cultivation with some depth as well. Like the listing by plant type. Definitely recommend as a first reference for growing citrus and to keep on hand when you need some advice. Great photos and illustrations. Fun to read as well as practical and informative. Tips on micro-nutrients and chelated minerals to avoid chlorsis was what I needed for a few plants. Good advice on root trimming and transplanting. Grow my citrus in containers and was worried the book would either gloss over patio/container cultivation or be too specific. Nice balance. More than just an introduction and as I say having at hand as a first reference.Nice source information for acidic fertilizers and pesticides.

There is some good information in this book about growing citrus and other fruits. I just wish that the pages on the citrus were in more detail, and not so brief. It is a small portion of the book, and that is disappointing. I would have liked more detailed information on the varieties instead of just a chart. Kind of misleading, as there are lots of other fruits that I was not interested in that took up more of the book.

I had selected an earlier edition for my library and was glad to see an update. The great, wonderful thing about this book is the excellent photographs of many varieties. The subtropical is just a nice bonus. As a Master Gardener, I get many questions from people who have lived in south Florida and other countries more tropical. They usually say "In wherever they had a tree that had....fruit, or leaves or flowers. This book is very helpful.

While the book is mainly titled, Citrus, I bought it for information on some of the more rare subtropical fruits detailed and I was not disappointed! There is a wealth of info on all sorts of plants you can grow in some of the more limited areas of Florida and California. If you, like me, are lucky enough to live here, you know you can grow all kinds of things beyond apples and peaches (and indeed, guavas and Surinam cherries grow better here anyways). Very excited to have this volume in my library. Gives info on how to propagate, care for, and eat the plants detailed.

I wanted a book mostly about Citrus, this was not it. More than half the book deals with other subtropical fruit, so the name should have been: "Subtropical Fruits and Citrus". In essence, I got less than half a book. It could have gone into much more detail on citrus, but they chose not to.

I bought it for the citrus part of the book which is only half of the book. I did find the other parts interesting. It was able to answer about 70% of my questions about the different varieties of citrus. Good starter book.

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
