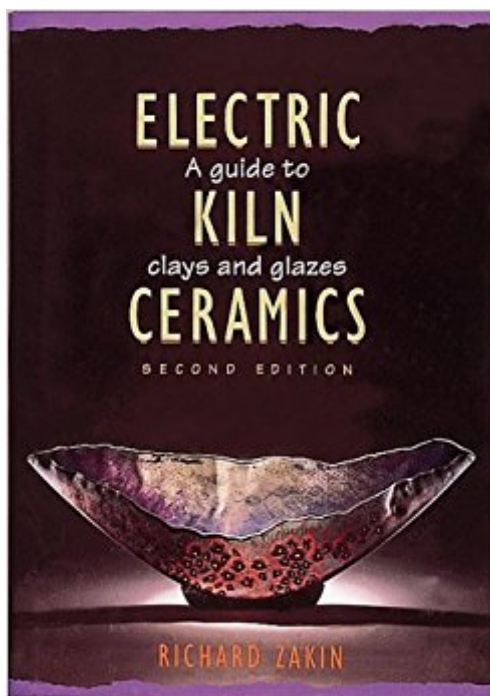

This is an excellent book on ceramics and is one of the only books that actually tells us how to use an electric kiln with complete firing schedules. There is also a lengthy explanation of how to make your own glazes. All the different clay types are examined. The majority of the book contains many full color photos of different ceramic projects, some of which are psychiatrically very strange. I own a dozen or more books on ceramics and this one contains information that is lacking in all of the others. I'm talking about things like safety precautions when making and using glazes. It's a rather expensive book but essential to anyone, especially a novice, who wants to fire in a home kiln.

The author does an excellent explanation of problems and solutions for glaze firing "mistakes" and how to create or avoid them. Easy read, wonderful examples, beautiful pictures.

I'm still not sure we're going to invest in a ceramics kiln, but this was a very interesting book about the craft. Too much biography of famous contemporary ceramic artists (totally uninteresting - these

are not names that mean anything to me, so, bleah), but otherwise interesting explanations of different types and techniques. A very worthwhile book - it will probably either galvanize you into investing in the kiln and materials, or turn you away from it, saving your money!

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
