

The fact of the matter is that not one of the front lines warriors that had the duty to fight, remained the same after the harrowing experience. For someone who never had a part on an armed conflict it

is very hard to feel what our courageous troops had to endure on a day to day basis. The Boys of '67: Charlie Company's War in Vietnam, by the very able author Mr. Andrew West, is the story of one singular company while serving in Vietnam. Is like getting to know each and everyone in Charlie Company, including glimpses of their lives before shipping out to Vietnam. An account as real as this one makes a person that never had to fight a war, realize that there is no aspect of the daily conflict that is worth being cheerful about, with the exception, perhaps, of those who remained alive at the end of the day being a little on the cheerful and thankful side. The book follows closely all the battles, letters to their loved ones, parts of their past when they were just unsuspecting teenagers unaware of what was to come their way, the string of their lives before, during and after. I know for a fact that these Americans deserved the outmost recognition, sort of the recognition given to our troops these days, but instead when those that returned to their homeland, expecting relief and appreciation, they found themselves being judged and maligned by their own countrymen. No welcome home they found, only accusations of this and that, by a segment of the population who felt themselves morally superior than them. To me that has always been a crock of crap, for how easy is to protest, condemned and act as if one is better than those that answered the call of their nation and fought in a war that basically they would have preferred not to fight. I am not talking, of course, of the many courageous gung-ho that like their counterparts in the history of war, were dying to join and not miss the war. Only to learn later, that perhaps it was not the most brilliant of choices. No one left unscathed, either physically or mentally, that is for sure, from Vietnam. Those that did were probably on a rear assignment with pressed uniform, and a swimming pool to cool off the day's heat, while those like The Boys of '67: Charlie Company's War in Vietnam took on the brunt of a war that has been proven over and over, was badly fought, and critically commanded. Those who protested the war and run away from enlisting, have very little to say, because at the end of the day is the Armed Forces that keep this country strong, not their whining and criticism. I was in Vietnam during 1966-1967. I wasn't sure I wanted to relive some disturbing things I experienced as a 19 year old. But, the book told a tremendous story of a GREAT group of men. When we returned from our tour of duty, we weren't received with the accolades that others have received. Instead, we were called names and chided. Mr. Wiest told a hard story, but brought truth and honor to those who died and those who returned home.
