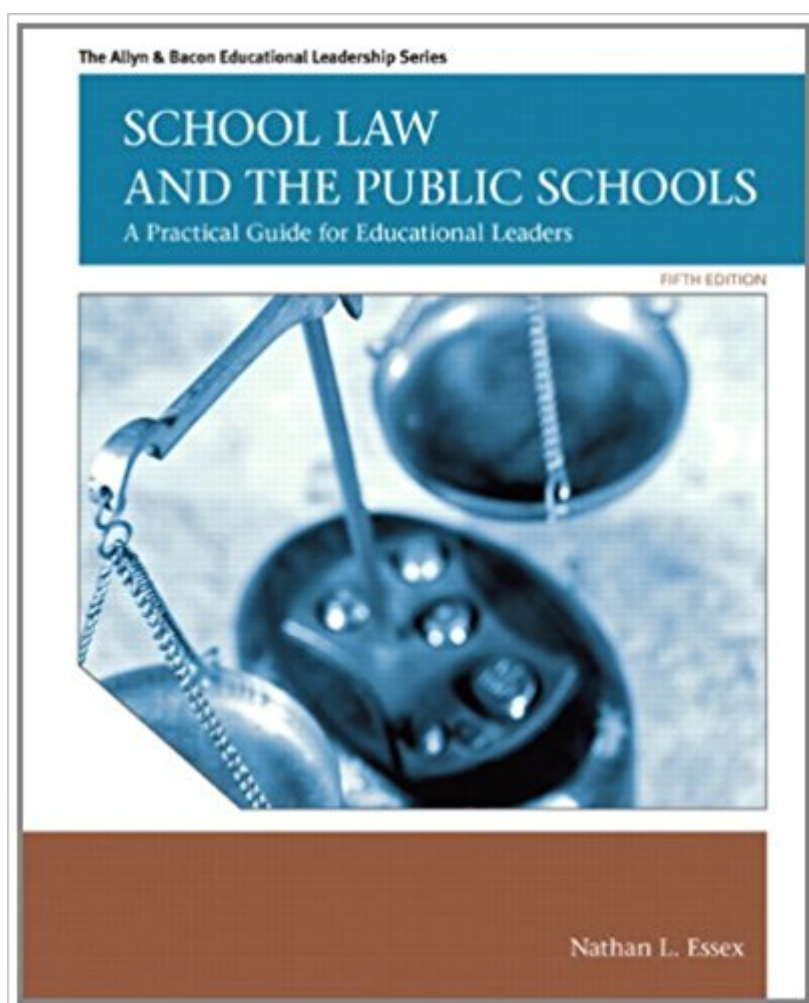


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School Law And The Public Schools: A Practical Guide For Educational Leaders (5th Edition) (Allyn & Bacon Educational Leadership)
