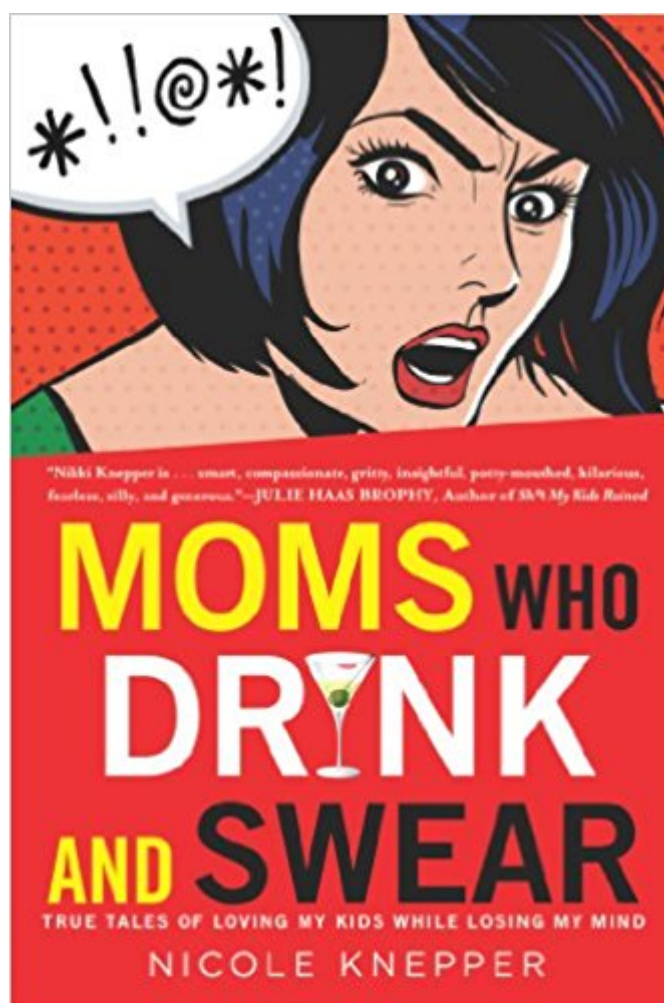

This is the best non-fiction book about being a mom that I have ever read. I was laughing out loud from the the first page on. I feel less alone, like the author was reading my mind and addressing my fears and worries about motherhood. This is a must-read for all moms who can admit they are not perfect.
